



Selector: Professor Richard Sawdon Smith



Richard Sawdon Smith is Professor of Fine Art and Director of Fine Art and Photography at Norwich University of the Arts, UK. He received his MA in Photographic Studies from Westminster University 1997. He is on the Editorial Advisory Panel of Journal of Photography & Culture, Patron of Norwich Film Festival, Trustee of the Council for Higher Education in Art & Design and Trustee of Norwich Pride. Previously a Board Member of bookRoom Press and Editorial Advisory Panel of Mustard TV, Norwich. He is a winner of the National Portrait Gallery Photographic Portrait Award; Co-editor of Langford's Basic Photography and The Book is Alive! His work is published and exhibited internationally.

I'm sure everyone in this position says what a difficult decision it is to select work when you have such a range of submissions and only a limited number of choices that you can make and therefore forced to edit work out which you would otherwise like to have exhibited. There was, as you might expect some recurring themes around the big genres of landscapes, portraits and still life but people approached each from their own perspective. From urban landscapes that situate the electricity pylon as an eerie spectre in suburbia, to environmental portraits that captured the amazing angst and joy on the face of crowds in the pub, assumedly watching football, or the immaculately reconfigured and reconstructed maps shot sympathetically in the studio.

#### Selector: Maria Falconer MA, MSc., FRPS



Maria Falconer is a photographic practitioner, teacher and writer. A former lecturer at De Montfort University and a Fellow of the Royal Photographic Society, she runs photography workshops across the UK and abroad.

Maria's commercial speciality is Dance Photo/Videography, collaborating with dance companies around the UK to produce promotional imagery. She has worked at the Edinburgh Festival every year since 2006, and her work has frequently been published in The Guardian, The Times, The Scotsman, and The Telegraph. Maria's personal photographic projects often draw on her contemporary dance background, using the body and the camera collaboratively as a vehicle to express her ideas and experiences. Her photography has been exhibited around the world including the UK, the US, France, Belgium, Ireland and East Asia.

What an outstanding collection of images! An eclectic mix that has charmed, challenged, intrigued, moved, amused and occasionally mystified me! Such variety and depth are to be commended and I have genuinely enjoyed the selecting process. I am reluctant to discuss individual images because there simply are too many competing for my attention, but since I have been asked to do so, I will mention just two.

I find myself intrigued and captivated by the image on page 143. The improbable yet harmonious tones of the natural and manmade, the slightly off kilter composition and its delightful eccentricity reveal a way of seeing that is rare in photography. And I'm both amused and impressed by page 27.

Sometimes in life, events conspire to present a perfect photographic opportunity and other times photographers take matters into their own hands. Whether this photographer happened to come across this scene 'au natural' or had a hand in constructing it is of no matter. The net result is a poignant and humorous image that can't fail to bring a wry smile. Thank you for inviting me to select some images for your exhibition. It's wonderful to see the work of such a diverse and active photography group who aren't afraid to reveal who they are through their imagery.





These photographs were taken as a response to seeing people and life happening collectively again and the euphoric energy that came from that.








#### HinTa

I like to take pictures of shapes and make abstract compositions, which allows the viewer to form their own interpretation of the subject.





The series "How to Disappear Completely" was born on the wave of the ethical dilemmas arising from the pre-approval of the new Public Order Bill that is 'sleepwalking' England 'into fascism' The bill criminalises the most traditional methods of non-violent civil action since Muriel Matters and Helen Fox chained themselves in the House of Commons (1908).


"How to Disappear Completely" expresses the fear and chaos caused by censorship, the urge to hide and protect my subjects' identities and that deep sense of guilt caused by the random culpability generated by anti-democratic norms.






This photo plays with the concept of attention. In my images I am paying attention to what I see and for that moment I am lost in it.
