

The photography in this exhibition ranges from the strident to the subtle, from the forceful political statement to more meditative reflections on what might constitute a *sign of our times*. Satellite sex, nuclear contamination, urban culture, political merchandising - issues pertinent to life in contemporary Britain are offset by pictures of quieter, more personal events which become, in turn, metaphors for a wider experience.

Philip Lea's telling expose of life behind bars for Britain's young offenders lies alongside Tessa Bunney's 'Living in a Lamp Post", an intriguing exploration of that last romantic outpost, the lighthouse. Michael Copsey probes the quiet facade of surburban landscapes to find unexpected signs lurking on the surface, while Mabel Odessey's haunting depictions of fairground scenes refer us to a time and place dimly-remembered. Robert Taylor questions white culture's troubled relationship to other cultures, while Gavin Parry treats the Docklands phenomenon with a wry humour.

Diverse, eclectic and above all, vibrant, Sign of The Times is representative of the scope of photography in Britain today.
